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7he President's Idle Chatter

Hi all,

This month seems to be all about the weather. It doesn't rain it pours. Our thoughts are with those that are caught in the floods.

There is so much that is changing at the moment apart from the weather. Last month the rapid growth in sales of electric vehicles was highlighted by the third top selling vehicle being the Tesla model Y. It came in behind Hilux and Ranger. Who would have thought?

It does make you wonder about plugging in your electric vehicle and having it charge overnight from burning brown coal in the Valley. I'm told that this is still better for carbon pollution than driving a petrol or diesel vehicle though.

It also makes you wonder what will happen when we go from less than 2% electric vehicles currently to a majority of electric vehicles. Are we going to have enough electricity left to keep the lights on? In California in the US where there is a very rapid take up of battery electric vehicles (BEVs) there has been a study to see how much extra electricity is required in the future. In 2030 when it is projected that California will have 4 million BEVs in use, the extra power required will only be 5.4%. So there is hope that the increase in demand will not be overwhelming.

So in Australia, where we are behind the world in the sales of BEVs, it looks like there is time to increase renewable energy production and increase storage

capacity before the coal plants are shut down.

At least then when the car is charged overnight it will be with renewable energy.

It will be fascinating to watch how this develops over the coming years.

The Geelong show and the rain caused some changes to our events last month. The hot dog run was relocated to the clubrooms at the last minute but still managed a good turnout and a very pleasant get together. And it didn't even rain.

We finally managed to get the B24 Liberator speaker, Tony Nuller, to the October Club night. What an entertaining chap he is. He knew all about the Liberator and a whole lot more, including anything you wanted to know about the Leyland P76.

B-24 Liberator Restoration Presentation

October's guest speaker was Tony Nuller, from B-24 Liberator Memorial Australia, a volunteer group located at the old Werribee Airfield and dedicated to the restoration of a WW2 B-24 Liberator bomber to its original specifications.

Tony said the plane was one of only eight of its type left in the world and the only one in the southern hemisphere. The fuselage for this plane was found in a backyard in Moe: the wings and a tail in New Guinea. (The tail subsequently fell off the ship transporting it to Australia!) Other bits have come from all over the world, including from RAF and RAAF sources and new in boxes under a suburban house! The project receives no government grants, with all funding coming from bequests, benevolent funds, donations and museum entries.

As well as the Liberator, the group has an Airspeed Oxford trainer, an Avro Anson twin engine trainer and an Australian Boomerang fighter being restored in its hangar on the former Werribee Airfield, off the Princes


Highway (cnr Old Farm Rd), coming into Werribee. The display is open from 9.30am to 3.30pm on Tues, Thurs & Sun.

The B-24 Liberator Memorial Australia group is part of an Australia-wide Aviation Museum National Network, dedicated to preserving, restoring and displaying Australia's aviation heritage in museums all around the country.

The B-24 Liberator

Over 186,000 Liberators were built and they were a vital Allied work horse, including in Papua New Guinea and the islands to Australia's north. These long range heavy bombers were powered by four Pratt and Whitney rotary engines, each driving a 3-bladed variable pitch propeller, and carried an 8,000lb (3,600kg) payload. Because of the long distances flown, the Liberators could not always be given fighter cover (the fighters didn't have the range). As a result the bombers were heavily armed, with up to 10 machine guns mounted in nose, waist, tail and upper turrets (armament varied, with several versions). Despite this they were vulnerable to ground fire and both Japanese and German fighter planes.

Original designs were derived from a flying boat – as evidenced by their deep, slab-sided fuselages. They were created as an alternative to the B-17 Flying Fortress, with design specs requiring a bigger payload, higher cruising speed, greater range and higher ceiling. The first plane was completed in December 1939, and England and France ordered 155 and 122 respectively. With the fall of France, all of these planes went to England.



RAAF

Australian aircrew seconded to the Royal Air Force flew Liberators in all theatres of the war, including with RAF Coastal Command, in the Middle East, and with South East Asia Command, while some flew in South African Air Force squadrons. Liberators were introduced in the RAAF in 1944. The USAAF transferred some aircraft to the RAAF, while the remainder would be delivered from the USA under Lend-Lease. Some RAAF aircrew were given operational experience in Liberators while attached to USAAF squadrons. Seven flying squadrons, an operational training unit, and two special duties flights were equipped with the aircraft by the end of World War II in August 1945.

The RAAF Liberators saw service in the South West Pacific theatre of World War II. Flying mainly from bases in the Northern Territory, Queensland and Western Australia, aircraft conducted bombing raids against Japanese positions, ships and strategic targets in New Guinea, Borneo and the Netherlands East Indies. Some also supported covert operations conducted by the Allied Intelligence Bureau; and others were converted to VIP transports.

A total of 287 B-24s were supplied to the RAAF, of which 33 were lost in action or accidents, with more than 200 Australians killed.

Following the Japanese surrender, the RAAF's Liberators participated in flying former prisoners of war and other personnel back to Australia. Liberators remained in service until 1948, when they were replaced by Avro Lincolns.






